Will women get advances in Equal Pay for Equal Work in Maryland this year? What about Paid Sick Leave, Fair Work Scheduling, Annual Paid Sick Days and Safe Day, or improved Stalking and Harassment laws, or Termination for Parental Rights of rapists? And how will our Howard County AAUW legislation act to Extend the Age of Child Support to age 22 to help custodial parents in providing for a college education for their children?

All of these legislative matters are in the midst of deliberation in the General Assembly in Annapolis at our deadline date for this article. As we write this column, AAWU Maryland has been sending letters of support, providing testimony, and sending alerts to branches asking our members to make calls to support these and other important bills under consideration.

We thank our members who have been actively involved in making things happen for women and families in Maryland. Your calls and emails really do make a difference. But since we do not have a working crystal ball, we can't share happy (or not so happy) results with you right now. We promise to provide you with a summary of the outcome of the 2016 State legislative year for women and families at the AAUW Spring Convention.

We also want to alert you to the newly-released 10th annual National Census of Domestic Violence Services conducted by the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV) on September 16, 2015 and the release at the end of February, 2016. Twenty-two Maryland local domestic violence programs participated in the 24-hour survey, which documented the life-saving services offered by these programs.

The Maryland data for the census day found that 1,095 victims were served in one day. Additionally, 407 domestic violence victims (208 children and 199 adults) were served in emergency shelters or transitional housing; 688 adults and children received non-residential assistance and services, including counseling, legal advocacy, and children's support groups. On this one day, 531 hotline calls were answered, and 51 people were educated in prevention and education trainings. In addition to these high numbers of services rendered, there were still 76 unmet service needs on the census day.

Get familiar with domestic violence issues for women and families in Maryland. Do you know what the domestic violence services, needs and issues are available for your area? How can you help advocate for better services?

Though over half of the goal has been reached, still a few thousand more dollars are needed. Everyone in Maryland is appreciative of every single gift toward this special award.

AAUW'S "CHARTING THE COURSE": WHAT IS IT AND HOW CAN YOU PARTICIPATE?

AAUW has played an important role in working toward equality for women. Many achievements have been made, but there is still much to be done to gain full equality with men. Women are still on average paid only 78 cents for every dollar men are paid. Only 20% of the members of Congress are women, and only 5% of Fortune 500 CEOs are women.

Because of the work AAUW has done over the years in these areas, AAUW is well-positioned to work on taking these challenges to the next level. Hence, the campaign "Charting the Course." This campaign is geared to raise \$1,000,000 in unrestricted funds by December 31, 2016. Because these funds are unrestricted, AAUW will be able to put the money to programs where the need is greatest. Only one of AAUW's programs, fellowships and grants, is fully funded through restricted gifts. Every other program such as research, leadership development, and advocacy relies on unrestricted gifts. Tech Trek, \$tart \$mart, and Elect Her-Campus Women Win have been launched on a national scale because of unrestricted gifts.

These unrestricted funds give AAUW the flexibility to act quickly in the face of any new challenges facing women and girls. Just a note, membership dues cover just 30% of AAUW's expenses.

To date over \$600,000 in contributions (nationally) have been made to this campaign. Donors numbering 375 have participated thus far. How can AAUW Marylanders participate? The easiest way is to go to <u>www.aauw.org</u> and click donate. There a link will be found that directs contributions toward the "Charting the Course" campaign.

There is an additional way that Branches can be recognized as "Charting the Course" Navigators. If ten or more branch members make individual gifts totaling \$25,000 or more by December 31, 2016, the Branch will be recognized as a Navigator.

If a Branch or State makes a \$25,000 gift from its treasury by the deadline, it will be recognized as a Navigator.

All of us should consider how state and branch members can participate in this important venture.

Equal Pay Day

Equal Pay Day was originated by the National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE) in 1996 as a public awareness event to illustrate the gap between men's and women's wages.

The next Equal Pay Day is Tuesday, April 12, 2016.



Since Census statistics showing the latest wage figures will not be available until late August or September, NCPE leadership decided years ago to select a Tuesday in April as Equal Pay Day. (Tuesday was selected to represent how far into the next work week women must work to earn what men earned the previous week.) The date also is selected to avoid religious holidays and other significant events.

Because women earn less, on average, than men, they must work longer for the same amount of pay. The wage gap is even greater for most women of color.

The National Committee on Pay Equity (NCPE), founded in 1979, is a coalition of women's and civil rights organizations; labor unions; religious, professional, legal, and educational associations, commissions on women, state and local pay equity coalitions and individuals working to eliminate sex- and race-based wage discrimination and to achieve pay equity.

Wear RED on Equal Pay Day and wear something red for the April 30 AAUW Maryland Convention

to symbolize how far women and minorities are "in the red" with their pay!

Anne Arundel Branch Hosts Exciting STEM Program

On Dec. 5, more than 70 excited fourth-grade girls and their accompanying adults attended a successful "STEM Girls Count!" program at Anne Arundel Community College. Girls representing 16 elementary schools throughout Anne Arundel County were selected to attend by their school principals and teachers. Eighteen elementary school teachers also participated in the event and will continue mentoring in STEM.

The girls participated in a variety of engaging hands-on activities that highlighted careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. The activities illustrated the fields of architecture, chemistry, electrical engineering, information technology, nutrition, microbiology, physical sciences and cybersecurity all led by women who have careers in these fields and work in Anne Arundel County. Parents and sponsors attended lively panel discussions on "how girls grow" and mentoring them on STEM subjects and careers.

The program was originated by the Anne Arundel County branch of the American Association of University Women and planned in collaboration with the Anne Arundel County Public Schools and Anne Arundel Community College, who also hosted the event.

"By starting at the elementary school level, the program hoped to provide key encouragement for girls to consider careers in which women are still significantly under represented, such as engineering and computer sciences," said Dr. Judith MacGregor, AAUW-AAC STEM coordinator for the event. AAUW's mission is advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research.

AAUW Kensington-Rockville Branch Members Tour the Folger Shakespeare Library

On a frigid Saturday morning in February, fifteen members of the Kensington-Rockville Branch toured the commemorative exhibit, *The Wonder of Will: 400 Years of Shakespeare*. Our knowledgeable docent, Ian Bannon, regaled us with tales of the playwright, the poet, the man, and the icon as we explored the Elizabethan Theatre, Reading Room, Founder's Room and Great Hall. Henry Clay Folger, former president of Standard Oil, and wife Emily Jordan Folger established the library in 1932 to provide Americans with greater access to the bard. Included in the collection are 82 copies of the 1623 *First Folio* of 36 of Shakespeare's plays – nearly a third of the world's surviving copies -- along with thousands of playbills, costumes, recordings, props and works of fine art. After the delightful tour, Branch members dined on hearty meals at the Café Berlin on Capitol Hill.

- a huge room sized mouth invited guests to enter was created by Wayne Coyne of the Flaming Lips
- the earring project that involved the behavior of saving one earring when the other is lost. It is a behavior across many cultures and speaks of hope.

We also enjoyed the largest exhibition of paintings and portraits by the late Eddy Mumma [Mr. Eddy]. He was a recluse and double amputee whose solace and delight was producing explosively joyful paintings. He loved crimson paint and his works are radiant and playful. The visitors will remember the unusual eyes.

Where to Go and How to Get There

AAUW Maryland Convention Saturday, April 30, 2016 Kittleman Room, Duncan Hall, Howard Community College 10901 Little Patuxent Parkway, Columbia, MD 21044

Directions to Howard Community College

Directions from the west: Take I-70 east to Rt. 29 south. Take the Town Center/Little Patuxent Parkway exit 20B on the right. This will take you to Rt.175 west, which changes to Little Patuxent Parkway. At the third light on the right is Governor Warfield Parkway. Take the right ramp and, at the next light, turn left at Campus Drive. Once you are on Campus Drive in the left lane, follow directions below to find Duncan Hall.

Directions from the south: Take I-95 north to Rt. 32 west, exit 41. Get in the right lane and take Rt. 29 North to exit 18, Broken Land Parkway, turning left when you reach the second light, which is the intersection of Little Patuxent Parkway and Broken Land Parkway. You will see building complexes across Little Patuxent Parkway, including apartment buildings. Stay in the left lane of Little Patuxent Parkway until you reach the second traffic light at Campus Drive on the left at the light. Get in the left lane and enter the Howard Community College campus. Follow directions below.

Directions from the north: Take I-95 south to Rt. 100 west. Stay on Rt. 100 West in the left lane. Take the last exit (about 5 miles from I-95) on the left which says Rt. 29 South, Washington. Enter Rt. 29 south in the left lane. Merge to the right lane and take exit 20B, Little Patuxent Parkway. Get in the left lane of Little Patuxent Parkway until you reach the next traffic light at Campus Drive on the left. Turn left at the light and follow directions below.

Directions from the east: Take either Rt. 100 west or Rt. 32 west towards Columbia from I-95. Then take Rt. 29 south from Rt. 100 or Rt. 29 north from Rt. 32, Exit 18. From either direction, take Exit 18 onto Broken Land Parkway towards Little Patuxent Parkway going west. Take a left turn at the intersection of Little Patuxent Parkway and Broken Land Parkway at the traffic light. Office Buildings and apartment complexes are across from Little Patuxent Parkway. Turn left on Little Patuxent Parkway and stay in the left lane until you reach the second traffic light at the intersection of Little Patuxent Parkway and Campus Drive on the left. Turn left onto Campus Drive and follow directions below.

Campus Directions

After arriving at the college, take the Campus Drive entrance to the college, via a left turn on Little Patuxent Parkway. Go straight on Campus Drive until you reach a roundabout with different exits to different parts of the campus. Take the 2nd right exit (located at "9" if this represented a clock) towards Duncan Hall. You will see a parking lot A on the left and the Duncan Hall across from it. Park in Lot A. Take the sidewalk to the entrance at Duncan Hall, and

the Kittleman room is on the right, #100. If there are no available parking spots in Lot A, return to the entrance, make a U-Turn and park in Lot F, the large lot on the right of the entrance road. *Below is a map of the Howard Community College Campus.*

Hotel Arrangements for the Convention

For those who want to come to Columbia on Friday, April 29th, AAUW Howard County has negotiated special rates at the hotel. The hotel requires that reservations must be made on or before **Friday**, **April 8**, **2016**. He earned a bachelor's degree from George Washington University and holds master's and doctoral degrees in social work from Howard University. Anthony is a licensed clinical social worker and associate professor in the Department of Social Work at Delaware State University.

Marylander

More girls than ever before are studying and excelling in science and mathematics. Yet the dramatic increase in girls' educational achievements in these fields has not been matched by similar increases in the numbers of women working as engineers and computing professionals. The report *Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing* takes a closer look at the two STEM fields where the jobs are but women aren't and advises what we can do to add women.





Speaking about *Solving the* Equation will be **Catherine Hill**, who is the vice president for research at AAUW and an author of several AAUW reports including *Women in Community Colleges: Access to Success* (2013); *Graduating to a Pay Gap: The Earnings of Women and Men One Year after College Graduation* (2012); and *Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics* (2010). Before coming to AAUW, Catherine Hill was a study director at the Institute for Women's Policy Research and an assistant professor

in planning and public policy at the University of Virginia. She has a bachelor and master's degree from Cornell University and a Ph.D. in policy development from Rutgers University.
