Dr. McCauley has been an educator and active community citizen in Garrett County for nearly 30 years. As the teaching Principal at Crellin Elementary, Dana has been a transformational leader in the field of environmental and place-based education on both the local and national

level. She has led the development of multiple programs that emphasize using the community as a means for student research projects and service learning. Dana has created a unique learning environment for the children of Crellin that will reap benefits in their individual lives as well as to our community for generations.

Dana and Crellin Elementary have received numerous national awards including the Ernest L. Boyer Center Award for Excellence in Character Education (2008); the Intel School of Distinction for Elementary School Mathematics (2011); the Richard A. Johnson Environmental Education Award (2012) and the Konrad Lindenberg Memorial Individual Award (2014). While these awards are characteristic of Dana's outstanding commitment to education and her community, her greatest accomplishments lie in her every day interactions with her students, staff and community families. She had a vision for reinvigorating her school and community, a vision she keeps alive by teaching civic responsibility to her students and encouraging them to care for each other and for their world. Her success involves caring relationships, healthy activities, and meaningful work all to the benefit the community while emphasizing children's skill-building over test preparation and hours of homework. Dana has created a blueprint for the way forward in education in America.

While Dana's influence, inspiration and effect extend to both the young and the old, male and female, she strives to provide a strong female presence in the lives of the young girls within her scope of influence. 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Barbara Miller currently serves as the Vice President of Family Economic Security at Garrett County Community Action. She has been a part of the Community Action network for over 20 years working in several capacities. Barbara has also, throughout her career; provided training on a variety of topics both locally and on the national level. She is certified to train Cultural Diversity for Service Providers, Strength-based Case Management from Temple University, Financial Literacy and Credit Repair from NeighborWorks and is a Lifetime trainer for "Bridges Out of Poverty". Additionally, she has developed several of her own courses on various topics to support the people who work on the front lines of social service work. Barbara is a native of Ohio with a BA in Sociology from Lakeland University in WI. She is a mother of 3 and grandmother of 8 - which she counts as her greatest achievement.

DR. SUNSHINE BROSI



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Dr. Sunshine Brosi is an Associate Professor of Ethnobotany and Forest Ecology at Frostburg State University in western Maryland where she runs the only Bachelor's-level program in Ethnobotany in the US. She is the President of the Society for Economic Botany; the premier ethnobotanical research society. She has a PhD in Natural Resources (University of Tennessee), a Masters in Forestry (University of Kentucky), and a BA in Environmental Studies (Warren Wilson College).

Dr. Brosi was the recipient of 2012-2013 AAUW's American Fellowship. She has taught over sixteen different courses including field courses in Cherokee, NC; Harlan County, KY; Mission, SD, and rural Alaska. Dr. Brosi focuses on attracting and retaining women and minorities into natural resources programs by including culture in the biology classroom.

Dr. Brosi is the middle child of a family of nine from the coalfields of Eastern Kentucky. Throughout her childhood, her family was the recipient of federal food assistance, a legacy of poverty that continued when she became a mother in her early 20s. During her PhD program and tenure-track portions of her career she was a single mom. The support of the AAUW Fellowship was a pivotal financial boost that has immensely assisted her career.

Eileen is currently a member of the national board of AAUW and is Communications Vice President for AAUW Maryland. She formerly served as President of AAUW Maryland and has served as Secretary, Educational Foundation Vice President, and Web Master/Facebook administrator for MD. Eileen is on the board of the Baltimore branch. She earned her bachelor's degree from Washington College (MD) and master's degree from the University of Maryland University College. From 2008 – 2014, she was President of VGIF (the Virginia Gildersleeve International Fund), an international fund for women and girls. Eileen was a legal systems manager at the U.S. Justice Department. She now works part-time as a business analyst at the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission.

Catherine Hill is currently Executive Director of the Women's Caucus for the Maryland General Assembly and researcher for the Women's Institute for Secured Retirement. She is also former vice president for research at AAUW and is an author of many publications, including *Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership*, Solving the Equation: Women in Engineering and Computing, and Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. Catherine's work has been cited in many media outlets, including the New York Times, the Washington Post, NPR, and Time magazine. Previously,

Catherine was a study director at the Institute for Women's Policy Research and an assistant professor at the University of Virginia. She has a bachelor's and master's degree from Cornell University and a doctorate in policy development from Rutgers University.

She practiced law for several years, concentrating on immigration, employment law, business consulting, and veterans' benefits. to Ensure Gender Equity in Education (2012). She holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Southern California and a law degree from American University's Washington College of Law.
