Civility to Highlight AAUW Maryland Fall Meeting

For thousands of years, people have struggled with staying respectful and courteous toward others. We are currently seeing a huge resurgence of interest in civility. Each generation comes to it anew. Triggers include road rage, the internet, Facebook, political polarization, texting and tweeting. And with more high-speed communication and mobile devices, it's tempting to participate in conversations instantaneously, without always thinking how our comments might impact others.

The Fall Meeting will focus on the important and, sadly, all-too-urgent topic of civility. We will share insights on civility—what this concept entails and how we might go about restoring and maintaining more civil discourse and behavior in a respectful, functioning society. We will include such aspects as cyber-attacks and bullying.

Daniel L. Buccino, Director, Johns Hopkins Civility Initiative will be the featured speaker. He is the clinical manager for the Johns Hopkins Broadway Center for Addiction, the founder and director of the Baltimore Psychotherapy Institute, and an advisor and trainer for the International Center for Clinical Excellence.

News about State Dues

Important decisions were made at the Board meeting right after the summer program in Frederick. The Board agreed with a proposal by Edie Alison to cut state dues in half for new members who join at Shape the Future events. Shape the Future is a national AAUW program that allows people who join AAUW at a meeting that is advertised to the public to join AAUW for half the

national dues. Branches and states have the option, but are not required, to offer half-off their dues. Some, but not all branches offer half dues for new members who join at publicly advertised meetings. Now state dues will also be cut in half for those new members.

And there's more: Branches receive one free national membership for every two new members recruited at branch community activities. There is a maximum limit of three free memberships in each fiscal year. Redemption forms must be completed to earn the free memberships. See the AAUW website for more details:

Nomination for Maryland's 2020 Woman of Distinction are due October 5th!

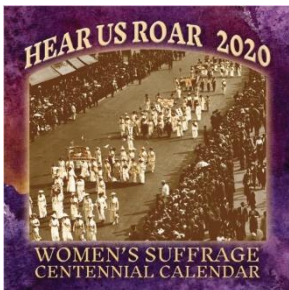
At the July 2019 Board meeting, we approved our continued sponsorship of the Women of Distinction Ceremony at the \$20K level. Our awardee will speak at the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) Woman of Distinction ceremony in late May/early June 2020 at the

University of Maryland, College Park. It draws about 1000 college students from all over the country. Our most recent honorees include Judy Carbone, Kate Campbell Stevenson and Cleopatra Campbell.

The criteria for nomination include the following: (1) the honoree will inspire the young women attending the conference; (2) the honoree will inspire others to contribute to the fund in her name; (3) AAUW membership and activities of the nominee will be considered when making the selection. A brief biography and description of how the nominee meets the criteria should be sent to Bea Dane at bea_dane@comcast.net no later than October 5th. A committee will review the nominations and recommend the honoree at the October 26th State Board meeting for approval.

It's not too early to start the fundraising and contribute to this important event. The fund number is 4355 – Maryland Women of Distinction (NCCWSL). I encourage every branch to budget a donation to this fund! Branch treasurers and individuals can send a check to AAUW National noting the fund number or give me a check at the October 26th meeting. AAUW Maryland Summer Program a Great Experience

How important is it for AAUW to include members with diverse characteristics? Why?

The AAUW Maryland Summer Meeting explored dimensions of diversity—age, gender, race, ethnicity, economic status, sexual orientation, etc.—and the value of inclusion.

During the morning, participants were immersed in groundbreaking research presented by

Dr. Bruce J. Stewart, a nationally recognized expert. Dr. Stewart led us in a dynamic

and instructive seminar. His use of active learning techniques as well as his sense of humor and ability to connect with individuals and draw us into his vision made the experience both instructive and lots of fun.

Dr. Stewart helped us understand the root causes of cultural biases that lead to exclusion of certain groups of people within our society. The bottom line was that 1) exclusion is the heart of the problem, and 2) inclusion is the strategy to overcome it.

Welcome people and respect and value their uniqueness. Why? Diversity plus inclusion equals better performance.

Important notes: You can't expect everyone to be the same. What you can do is build connections. Small acts of inclusion matter. People want to belong, but they also want to be their own unique selves. Have compassion. Explain your views in a nonthreatening way. Build habits of inclusion.

Going forward: Great teams build relationships. Talk to each other. Create spaces where people can get to know each other.

In the afternoon, small group discussions developed ideas branches could put into action what we learned at this meeting.

Group 1 – Reporter: Kashay Webb

- Invite diverse groups to meetings to discuss their oral histories (i.e., African American Communities).
- Reach out to high school students to plant the AAUW seeds early.
- Recruit via Facebook, chat groups.
- Develop, print and insert branch bookmarks in student graduation gift bags.

Group 2 – Reporter: Terri Massie-Burrell

- Don't alienate newcomers to meetings.
- Give newcomers, potential members and guests a yellow mug (or any color) which will identify them, and they can be introduced during the meeting.
- Remember disabled citizens. Reach out to the Arc.
- Perform outreach to Community Colleges.
- Give GED scholarships.

Group 3 – Reporter: Dorothy Fraquelli

- Provide space where everyone is welcome.
- Multiply AAUW's exposure by joining forces with other organizations (ex: Communities United Against Hate, etc.)
- Consider programs like Project Forward Start, a program run by Frederick Community College that gives money for women going back to school. AAUW Frederick gives money to this group.

Group 4 – Reporter: Bea Dane

- Target the following sources for membership: Empty Nesters; Retired people; Baby Boomers; Millennials; LGBTQA
- Consider how to reach out to each group, who all have different needs, interests, and schedules. Schedule a variety of recruitment events, for example: Sip and Paint; retirement seminars, etc.

It is AAUW Maryland’s hope that individual branches consider some of the suggestions listed above as they recruit and welcome new members into their organizations.



A special thank you goes out to Dr. Bruce J. Stewart, who travelled so far to be with us to share his ground-breaking research and to stimulate further dialog that took place during the meeting. Thanks to the Mary Anne Williams and the Frederick Branch team for the wonderful food and hospitality that made everyone feel welcome at this meeting, and Mary Anne even got us dancing...

Nancy Grace Roman's Legacy Gift to AAUW

AAUW has received the largest bequest in its history from the estate of Dr. Nancy Grace Roman, AAUW Maryland Woman of Distinction in 2016. Dr. Roman was a member of the Bethesda-Chevy Chase Branch, an astronomer, the first woman executive at NASA, and the "Mother" of the Hubble Space Telescope. She directed that the funds be used for STEM related activities. The AAUW staff is researching how best to use this generous bequest.

Among the many iconic recreations are those of the elaborate coronation robes worn by Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip in 1952, as well as Elizabeth's crown.

The Winterthur excursion will also offer an hour-long curated tour of Winterthur's main museum collection and a narrated tram ride through the extensive gardens, which feature 13 unusual "follies" – ranging from an Ottoman tent to a fairy cottage. Frederick - Project Forward Step

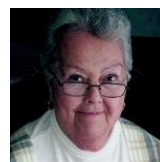


Project Forward Step is a counseling, information and referral service designed to meet the needs of returning adult students with special services for single parents and displaced homemakers.

Daniel L. Buccino, MA, MSW is the clinical manager for the Johns Hopkins Broadway Center for Addiction, the founder and director of the Baltimore Psychotherapy Institute, and an advisor and trainer for the International Center for Clinical Excellence.



With P.M. Forni, Mr. Buccino was a Founding Member of the Johns Hopkins Civility Initiative in 1998 and became its Director in 2014.

Mr. Buccino is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, and is Associate Professor at the Smith College School for Social Work and at the University of Maryland School of Social Work.

Mr. Buccino has published, lectured, and consulted widely on issues of psychotherapy outcomes, manners and mental health, the ethics and etiquette of health care, and on civility in health care, the academy, and in the workplace.

Hotel and Directions

Hotel Recommendation

The low demand for hotel rooms for the Fall Meeting means we could not reserve a block of rooms. However, if you plan to stay over either Friday or Saturday night, we recommend the **Holiday Inn Express**, 1100 Cromwell Bridge Road, Towson, MD 21286.

The hotel is newly renovated. It offers free breakfast, free Wi-Fi and has a fitness center, with outside pool. It is located just off the Baltimore Beltway (695). Current on-line prices for October 25, 2019, are approximately \$128 per night, before taxes and fees. Or call the hotel direct at 410-823-4410. The General Manager is Mark Wright.

Directions to Hotel

The Holiday Inn Express is located just off 695, the Baltimore Beltway.

From the West: Take I-70 to I-695 N to Exit 29A – Cromwell Bridge Road. At the bottom of the ramp turn right. At the next street, Gleneagles Ct, turn right, then immediately turn right into the Hotel parking lot.

From the South: Non-Toll directions: Take your choice of US 29, I-95, I-295 or I-97 to I-695 N/W (you want to go to Towson). Take I-695 N/W to Exit 29A – Cromwell Bridge Road. At the bottom of the ramp turn right. At the next street, Gleneagles Ct, turn right, then immediately turn right into the Hotel parking lot.

From the East: Non-Toll directions: From US50/US 301, take I-97 N to I-695 W. Take I-695 W to Exit 29A – Cromwell Bridge Road. At the bottom of the ramp turn right. At the next street, Gleneagles Ct, turn right, then immediately turn right into the Hotel parking lot.

From the North: Take your favorite route to I-695W. Follow I-695W to Exit 29B – Loch Raven Blvd. At the bottom of the ramp turn right into Cromwell Bridge Road. Go approximately 0.3 miles then turn right onto Gleneagles Ct, turn right, then immediately turn right into the Hotel parking lot.

From I-83: Take I-83 to I-695. Take I-695 E to exit 29A – Cromwell Bridge Road. At the bottom of the ramp turn right. At the next street, Gleneagles Ct, turn right, then immediately turn right into the Hotel parking lot.

Directions from the Hotel to Grace United Methodist Church

From the hotel parking lot, turn left onto Gleneagles Ct. then left onto Cromwell Bridge Road. At the second traffic light, turn right onto Loch Raven Blvd. Take Loch Raven Blvd approximately 3.1 miles to Northern Pkwy. Turn right onto Northern Pkwy. Go approximately 2.2 miles to a left into the Grace United Methodist Church parking lot. If you miss the turn, then turn left on N/ Charles Street, then take an immediately left into the Church parking lot.

From I-695N or I-695E:

Take exit 23A to merge onto I-83 S toward Baltimore. Follow I-83 to exit 10A-10B for Northern Parkway. On the ramp, keep left at the fork, follow signs for Northern Pkwy E. Use any lane to turn left onto W Northern Pkwy. In approximately 1.4 miles you will cross N. Charles Street. Take the next right into the Church parking lot. The parking lot is behind the church.

From I-95N:

Follow I-95N to I-395. Use the right 2 lanes to take exit 53 for Interstate 395 N toward Downtown/Inner Harbor. Follow I-395 for 0.9 miles then Use the right 2 lanes to turn slightly right onto W Conway St. In approximately 0.3 miles, use the left 2 lanes to turn left onto Light St. Go approximately 0.2 miles then Use the right 2 lanes to turn right onto E Pratt St. Go another 0.2 miles and turn left onto S Gay St. In approximately 0.4 miles, use the left lane to take the I-83 N ramp. Follow I-83 N to W Northern Pkwy. Take exit 10A from I-83 N onto Northern Pkwy. In approximately 1.4 miles you will cross N. Charles Street. Take the next right into the Church parking lot. The parking lot is behind the church.
