Our festivities begin with a tour of the historic Maryland State House on Friday at 4:00 p.m., led by Maryland Senator Edward Riley. Our State House is the oldest state capitol in continuous legislative use and the only state capitol to have served as the US Capitol. Based on our previous experience Senator Riley leads a very interesting tour!

After the tour, we hope you will join us in the dock area for dinner at 6 p.m. at Latitude 38. **Make sure to register early so that we reserve seats for you at dinner.** Dinner is at the expense of each individual diner. Late-comers can dine on their own at 7 p.m.

## TITLE IX: 50 YEARS OF PROGRESS

Whether watching the Olympics or other sports on television, it is impossible to miss the impacts of Title IX, passed 50 years ago. Women earned more medals in the last Olympics than men did. But it is important to note that the original Title IX legislation, signed by President Nixon, didn't actually mention athletics as a focus. Rather, it noted only that no person shall be excluded based on their sex (or gender identity) from participation in any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. It is also under Title IX that women have been able to get accountability for sexual harassment and sexual violence.

At this year's AAUW State Convention we will look at the implications of Title IX, with an emphasis on educational institutions throughout our country, by celebrating its successes over the past 50 years as well as exploring how we may improve on its provisions in the future.





Sara Collina, J.D., teaches courses related to sex and gender public policy in the Women's and Gender Studies Program at Georgetown University. As an expert on Title IX, Sara has been involved in efforts to reform sexual harassment policies at universities and in workplaces. She is also the founder and director of Blueberry Hill Strategies, whose mission is to assist gender justice and health care advocacy organizations thrive. Sara recently received The Dorothy Brown Award, a university-wide award for Outstanding Teaching Achievement (May 2020). Students nominate and select the award winner. Sara is a passionate teacher who believes that most of us dramatically underestimate our ability to learn.

# **AAUW Maryland Challenge to Branches**

AAUW Maryland is challenging each Maryland Branch to raise money to support our Maryland Woman of Distinction Honoree for 2022, Dr. Pat Stocker, who will address college student leaders as part of the annual National Conference for College Student Women Leaders (NCCWSL) in early June. Pat is currently the President of the Bethesda-Chevy-Chase Branch. Previously, she served as AAUW Maryland President and is current co-Program Vice President. She has helped organize stimulating programs for both Branch and State meetings.

Donations from Branch members across the state will help AAUW MD reach the goal of \$20,000 as a platinum sponsor of the Women of Distinction event. The deadline for contributions April 1, 2022.

AAUW Maryland challenges each branch to have all its Board members and fifty percent of Branch members contribute to the Maryland Woman of Distinction Fund. Branches who meet this contribution goal will be recognized at the AAUW Maryland Summer Conference. To receive recognition, your Branch should designate one member to keep track of the number of donations from Board and Branch members. Want to boost your Branch membership? The "Shape the Future" membership campaign is a tool that branches can use to recruit new members. Branches can offer 50% off national dues when prospective members join AAUW at an event or meeting. The branch also earns one free

national membership for every two new members they recruit, with a maximum of three free memberships annually.

Hold an event or meeting that highlights the AAUW mission. The top reason people join AAUW is because of our mission. Invite participants to join on the spot to receive 50% off the national dues. Through Shape the Future the discounted national dues are only \$31.00. Have the participant complete a membership form and pay the discounted national dues, plus pay the State and your branch dues.

Who is eligible for membership? AAUW membership is open to anyone with an associate degree (or equivalent, e.g. RN) or higher from an accredited educational institution. A new member is someone entirely new to AAUW or an individual who rejoins after two or more years of lapsed membership.

How to redeem free membership? Check the National Membership Database to see how many free memberships you have earned. These can be given to anyone who qualifies for membership. They must be used within the fiscal year in which they are earned.

This is something that we have been missing due to the pandemic. We have not been meeting in person except for small groups, such as our book groups, Great Decisions group, and bridge groups.


On March 25-26 we will be hosting the statewide convention, and we are looking forward to seeing many of you here in Annapolis. (See more on p. 10.)

The highlight of the AAUW-Garrett Branch summer was the Women's Equality Day 2021 Celebration, which due to the pandemic was about 18 months in the planning. On Saturday, August 28, 2021, in Sang Run State Park in McHenry, MD, we held our grand celebration. AAUW-Garrett Branch was the lead sponsor of the event in collaboration with a planning group with members from six women's organizations



in Garrett County and the Maryland State Park/DNR. It was a wonderful event that celebrated the 100<sup>th</sup> year anniversary of the passage of the 19<sup>th</sup> amendment giving women the right to vote. The highlights of the day included a march into the park with marchers singing a traditional Suffragist song; the performance of AAUW-Garrett Branch's production of the "Women's Monologues: Maryland Suffragists" which included portrayals of several women from Garrett County suffrage history; and the rededication after renovation of the 1872 Sang Run Election House, where women in Sang Run voted for the first time in 1920. It truly was a memorable day!!

As has been the case for so many branches, fundraising for us in AAUW-Garrett Branch continues to be a challenge. Before COVID-19 hit, we had been gifted an original piece of artwork by local paper artist Annie Morris Simcoe (www.abphart.com) to be raffled off during the year, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the Women's Right to Vote. The piece is one-of-a-kind and features a Suffragist on a Bicycle. Annie creates and colors her hand-made papers from local plants and then sews the paper into her beautiful art. We are so grateful and fortunate that she has donated this piece to us. We also invested in notecards featuring that work. Selling the raffle tickets and note cards this year has been difficult, as in-person events and tabling

opportunities were limited by high rates of COVID-19 cases in Garrett County. So, we finally placed the raffle tickets and notecards online at

**AAUW CEO Transition** – Gloria Blackwell was appointed AAUW CEO, effective October 18. Gloria is no stranger to AAUW members. From 2004 until last year, she was responsible for the Fellowships and Grants program. In 2020, she was named AAUW's Executive Vice President and Chief Program Officer.

Appointment of Board Member to Fill an Unexpired Term (through June 2023) - Dr. Kimberly Adams, a professor of Political Science at East Stroudsburg University, was appointed by the Board at its October meeting to fill a vacancy. She serves as a Selection Panelist for AAUW's American Fellowships and Research Publication Grant programs. Dr. Adams is an accomplished political scientist and activist with more than 15 years of experience in academia and the private sector. She has a track record of success in publications and public speaking on topics related to race, gender and politics. In addition to belonging to AAUW, she is a member of numerous organizations devoted to research, equity, social justice and women's equality.

AAUW MD was a platinum sponsor for the 27<sup>th</sup> MLAW Fall Conference, held November 13 on Zoom. The conference sets in motion our advocacy for the 2022 Maryland General Assembly session. Maryland Legislative Agenda for Women pulls together diverse Maryland advocacy organizations annually to support a slate of bills promoting the well-being of Maryland's women and families.

This year's conference opened with a message of support from Senator Chris Van Hollen. The panel discussion that followed focused on the conference theme: Building a Stronger Care Infrastructure. The panelists' message was that health care inequity results from disparities in housing, environment, mobility (access to vaccines) and multiple other reasons. Baltimore's health commissioner's focus on

infant mortality reduced infant mortality 38% in seven years. We need to bring public health to the forefront in our policy discussions, focusing on the most vulnerable in both short- and long-term solutions. Public health is about prevention. Everything ties to health.

Congratulations were given to the Maryland General Assembly Women's Caucus, which will celebrate 50 years in 2022. Currently 80 women serve in the General Assembly, constituting 42%.

#### **15 Bills Proposed for MLAW Support**

The primary reason for the conference was the presentation of 15 proposed bills for the 2022 legislative agenda. Detailed descriptions of the bills can be downloaded on the MLAW website homepage or at this link:

After members of MLAW submit their rankings for the 15 bills, six to eight of the bills will be announced as the MLAW agenda for 2022. AAUW MD, as an organization member of MLAW, will submit rankings that count as two votes. Many of our members are also individual members of MLAW and each is entitled to submit one ranking by Dec. 17.

AAUW MD's public policy committee is collecting rankings from each of our branches to determine the state's preferences. Please take the time to read the descriptions of the bills and participate in activities to support top priorities. MLAW's agenda is the core of our state public policy advocacy each year.

Welcome to Annapolis!


You may want to come early on Friday, before the State House Tour, or stay an additional day in Annapolis. March 25-27, 2022, is the city's weekend for celebrating Maryland Day (March 25) which commemorates the day settlers disembarked from two small sailing ships, the Ark and the Dove, onto Maryland soil. From Friday through Sunday, over 20 historic locations in the area will be open for free or \$1 admission. If you have time, you will not want to miss a walking tour of the Naval Academy: the Visitor Center is adjacent to the dock area and guided tours are available (government-issued ID required). If you spend an extra day in the capital, you may wish to

stay at one of the Historic Inns of Annapolis or book an extra day at **Country Inn and Suites by Radisson** and take advantage of their free downtown shuttle.

Parking downtown can be expensive in the historic area, but there are two parking locations that are quite reasonable. Parking at the State Garage, located at the corner of St. John's Street and Calvert Street, is free after 6 p.m. on Friday through the entire weekend. Reasonable daytime parking is available in the lot behind the Navy Marine Corps Stadium on Taylor Avenue, with a convenient shuttle operating about every 20 minutes. The free Annapolis Circulator trolley shuttles visitors between the other downtown garages and the historic areas.

Annapolis night life includes many excellent restaurants, pubs, music venues and shops in the downtown area, on West St. and in nearby Eastport. See https://www.visitannapolis.org/ for ideas.
